OVERVIEW

In this course, students will write a body of work spanning various forms of poetry and prose. The process of writing and shaping quality work is emphasized. Students will work together through the workshop process to edit, refine, and reflect on their writing. Students will be expected to share their work through various stages of completion.

GOALS OF THE ENGLISH PROGRAM

- 3. Use language with precision and clarity, appropriately and effectively.

COURSE STRANDS
