OVERVIEW

This course emphasizes the development of oral communication (listening and speaking), reading and writing skills through the study of themes such as care of pets and animal rights, historical events, monster films, and mystery stories. Reading and media resources serve as links to oral and written activities and help promote an understanding of French language and culture.

GOALS OF THE FRENCH PROGRAM

By the end of the course, students will:

- listen and respond to spoken texts, media works and presentations.
- express ideas, justify their opinions in conversations, teacher-guided discussions and written form.
- make oral presentations using appropriate structures, vocabulary and pronunciation.
- · read a variety of texts for comprehension and vocabulary enhancement.
- use the writing process (brainstorming, organizing, proofreading, revising) to create short, accurate written works.
